September 10 – Oradell, NJ — Tuesday's open gym at the Hoehl Gymnasium was jam-packed with coaching talent to see the Scarlet and Gold Talent. While there were a variety of students participating in various activities, a number of Crusaders got up and down (the court), putting on display their potential for some of

the strongest schools in the nation including: Vanderbilt, Harvard, University of Pennsylvania, Penn State, Davidson, St. Joseph University and Notre Dame.

Each of those schools were in attendance to take a step closer to recruiting senior shooter, Matt Zona to its university. For Matt, it's pretty clear he's narrowed his list down to some which fit within his priorities. "I'm looking for somewhere with great academics and basketball and somewhere I feel at home," replied Zona in an impromptu interview in HR class on Wednesday.

As a junior, he visited the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia. It was one "official visit" he made during his junior year. Athletes are allowed 5 official (paid) visits, where a college can cover travel, room and board costs, for a student athletes. He was preparing for his next two visits including Penn State and Notre Dame.

According to Matt, the best part of the recruitment process has been seeing his hard work come to fruition. The worst part so far has been the attention. "I don't love (it)." He said, "I really like to keep to myself."

There have been a number of other coaches on campus including Cael Sanderson, Head Wrestling Coach at Penn State University. The Nittany Lions have won 9 NCAA Team National Championships in Coach Sanderson's 10 years at the helm of the program.

University of Wisconsin was also making its pitch for senior, Joe Zargo who earned All-American status during this summer's wrestling circuit.

While certain sports are able to get coaches on BC's campus, that is not the case for EVERY SPORT! Be proactive. Speak with your coaches and the Crusader College Placement Center to assist with communicating with coaches and ensuring your son has an opportunity to participate in the college level if that is his desire.


rendition of the beloved "This is Our House" and "We love Shannon" chants.



Harriers Take Off at Second Meet in Three Days



BC defeated DePaul Catholic 15-50; Paramus Catholic 15-48; St. Joseph Regional 18-41, but dropped their score to Don Bosco Prep 31-24.



In Cross Country, like golf, low scores win. A runner who places first earns 1 point, second-2, and so on. Owen McCarthy ran a terrific race, using every ounce of energy remaining to burst at the end. His time of 17:07 was good for 2nd over all, just 1 second behind the winner. Alex Shaia ran a 17:55, placing fourth overall. Alex Costabile took 7th overall with a time of 18:17.

BOTW: Pied-Billed Grebe

September 10 – Mahwah, NJ – Did you ever have that nagging goal that always seemed just out of reach? It seemed like the cards were stacked against you and you were never going to reach your destiny.

That's the way I was feeling about seeing a Pied-billed Grebe this year.

No GroupMe texts nor Bergen County Needs List Alerts seemed to help. By the time I would arrive, no grebe. Oh, what is a grebe you ask?

Cornell University's birding site, <u>www.allaboutbirds.org</u> describes a pied-billed grebe as this: *Part bird, part submarine, the Pied-billed Grebe is common across much of* North America. These small brown birds have unusually thick bills that turn silver and black in summer. These expert divers inhabit sluggish rivers, freshwater marshes, lakes, and estuaries. They use their chunky bills to kill and eat large crustaceans along with a great variety of fish, amphibians, insects, and other invertebrates. Rarely seen in flight and often hidden amid vegetation, Pied-billed Grebes announce their presence with loud, far-reaching calls.

Back to the grebe story. So thanks to a good friend, Mr. Mascaro, I was able to follow his directions and after about 40 minutes he and I located this pied-billed grebe (pied means having two or more colors) in the pond at the first



parking lot at Darlington after the Cross Country meet.

And I can understand what you're thinking. If it looks like this, how can there possibly be more than one of them? While that criticism is

a little harsh, I apologize for taking this photo at this particular point in time as it is a bird in non-breeding plumage.



The second photo was of a PGB taking off from a pond I was visiting when we did our Football Trip to California in 2017.

Pied-billed grebes are CONSDERABLY SMALLER than a mallard or many other duck-like birds. That are maybe 14" or so and often they are found alone. I've seen a number over the years at the Reservoir in Oradell.

Cornell describes them as part submarine because they've seen them do things that are quite unique. Unlike Cormorants, anhingas and other diving (ocean) ducks, these little ones can simply submerge. The first time you see it, the a-ha light goes off regarding the submarine comment.

In Bergen County to date, 247 unique species of birds have been spotted. The "top" e-birder in Bergen County has recorded 221 of them or 89.47%. Currently Br. Fagan and I have seen at least 156 species within Bergen Count or 63.16%.


